## The Buddha's Return to Lumbinī in Newar Buddhist Art

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According to Newar Buddhists, Śākyamuni Buddha returned to his birthplace Lumbinī after his enlightenment. Depictions of his journey and visit to Lumbinī date back to the seventeenth century. They show the Buddha riding standing up on a Nāga while being attended by Hindu deities in service to him. The theme, known as the lumbin̄̄yātrā, is represented in numerous paintings and in wood and metal work and became especially popular in nineteenth- and twentiethcentury Nepal. In this paper I will trace the history of the lumbinīyātrā by examining descriptions in texts and artistic representations. I will then discuss elements of the yātrā which are also found independently in other contexts. In conclusion, I will offer some thoughts on the significance of the theme.

Gudrun Bühnemann is a Professor in the Department of East Asian Literature/Languages and Cultures of Asia at The University of Wisconsin-Madison. She has published extensively on South Asian iconography and ritual.
