

The term “tribute system” originated in the western world to theorize historical international relations of China. In imperial China no such theoretical conception existed, just as little as a “foreign ministry”. “Tribute system” derived from the term *chaogong* 朝貢 (to offer tribute) and describes a whole set of administrative concepts and institutions which served to manage the diplomatic and commercial foreign relations. The basic aims of this workshop are to scrutinize the concept “tribute system” and to discuss particular international (inter-)actions, the focus shall be laid on late imperial China (Ming and Qing dynasties).

Der Terminus „Tributsystem“ ist ein im Westen entstandener Begriff, um das konzeptuelle System der historischen Außenbeziehungen Chinas fassbar zu machen. Im kaiserzeitlichen China gab es keine entsprechende theoretische Konstruktion – genauso wenig wie ein Außenministerium. „Tributsystem“ leitet sich von dem chinesischen Begriff *chaogong* 朝貢 (Tribut darbringen) ab und beschreibt ein ganzes Set von administrativen Konzepten und Einrichtungen, mit denen sowohl der wirtschaftliche als auch der diplomatische Außenverkehr geregelt wurde. In diesem Workshop sollen sowohl die Konzeption „Tributsystem“ kritisch hinterfragt als auch spezielle internationale (Inter-)Aktionen diskutiert werden. Der Fokus liegt auf dem späten Kaiserreich (Ming- und Qing-Dynastien).
