Power, Profit & Planetary Life:

The Global South and Socio-Ecological Liberation in the Capitalist World-Ecology

Ninth Annual Conference of the World-Ecology Research Network, Jakarta, July 19-21, 2023

The climate crisis amplifies longstanding inequalities of power and wealth in global capitalism. For over a half-century, the "environmental" question has been central to contentious world politics, framed by growth, sustainability, development, and justice. Growth. Sustainability. Justice. Development... For whom? And in what configuration(s)? As the deepening climate crisis leads to new proclamations of a "climate emergency" coupled with calls for "Green New Deals," new conditions of constraint and possibility emerge. What are the opportunities for states and movements to pursue an egalitarian climate justice strategy that challenges the Global North's extraordinary concentration of wealth and power?

This conference explores and reconstructs the socio-ecological relations of power, profit and life that have governed combined and uneven development since 1492. We welcome all manner of contributions narrating and conceptualizing the socio-ecological relations that have created, reinvented, and reproduced North-South inequalities. Proposals may emphasize small or large geographical scales, over long or short temporal frames. In line with world-ecology's critique of the disciplines, scholars from all fields are welcome. Proposals should engage, in whatever way is most reasonable for the topic, contemporary biospheric crisis and its historical development. They should, moreover, directly address key historical and conceptual themes of the world-ecology conversation: https://www.academia.edu/Documents/in/World-Ecology. Where there are differences, these should be stated openly as an opportunity for debate. Proposals that seek to amplify, revise, extend, and transcend major concepts in the world-ecology conversation through historical and empirical argument are especially encouraged.

- Class configurations in the global south: biotarian, femitarian, and proletarian
- Permanent war as an environment-making process and relation, north and south
- The capitalogenic trinity: the climate class divide, climate apartheid, climate patriarchy.
- Civilizing Projects and ruling abstractions, from Columbus to the Washington Consensus.

We welcome paper and panel proposals on these and other themes relevant to the world-ecology conversation.

The <u>World-Ecology Research Network</u> is a global conversation of academics, activists, and artists committed to understanding human relations of power, production, and environment-making in the web of life. An evolving conversation rather than a theory, the world-ecology approach is unified by a critique of Nature-Society dualisms, a world-historical interpretation of today's planetary crisis, and an emphasis on the porous and constituting relations of race, class, and gender in capitalism's environmental history.

We are happy to work with artists and activists to develop creative ways to present their work in ways that may differ from conventional academic presentations. As always, some of our keynote speakers will be drawn from accepted abstracts.
